Brethren, I stayed up late last night, my son's art pad open in front of me on the coffee table. I was planning. With markers, pens, and pencils I drew boxes and lines attempting to illustrate the proper chain of authority in a Masonic lodge. I began with the Master, and placed the Wardens below him. But then I lost my way. I looked to the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Lodge of Texas, I reread the Officers' Installation in the Monitor. I went over work in my head. I was increasingly blocked on the page; the boxes stubbornly refused to arrange themselves in a convenient pyramid.

On a fresh page I began again, but this time I arranged the officers as they sit in lodge. I drew lines to indicate relationships of authority, then assigned each lodge duty to an officer. I checked my sources to catch any stray committees, duties, or obligations. I scribbled. The paper was becoming crowded, but then - it came as a surprise to me - it was finished: all work of the lodge fit neatly in the new diagram. The place of each officer while seated in lodge perfectly illustrated his duties.

Equidistant between East and West, in the center of the lodgeroom, is the altar, upon which lies our Book of Sacred Law. In the East, the Worshipful Master sits slightly elevated, between our flags, facing the altar and overseeing the brethren. To those entering the lodgeroom from the West, the eye first falls upon the altar with its many symbols and lights; the Master's station, austere, provides the backdrop. The image is one of order and harmony.

The Wardens sit in the West and the South, directly facing the altar. They assist the Worshipful Master in executing the activities of the lodge, the Senior Warden while the craft is at labor, and the Junior Warden while the craft is at refreshment.

Other officers assist the three principal officers in the dispatch of their respective duties. The Senior Deacon sits at the right hand of the Master, the Junior Deacon at the right of the Senior Warden. The Deacons are the messengers of their respective officers. The Junior Warden is flanked by the Stewards, who prepare our meals.

What is Blue Lodge Masonry? The Blue Lodge is where we meet to make Masons. It is not a social order, yet, socializing is a part of our various functions. It is not a philanthropic order, yet, relief is one of the basic tenets of Freemasonry and we are obligated to provide relief within the boundaries of our abilities.

Blue Lodge Masonry is the foundation of everything Masonic. Without the Blue Lodge, the Scottish Rite, York Rite, Order of the Eastern Star, Shrine and other Masonic entities would not exist.

After being raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason, many brothers may ask themselves: "Is that all there is?" And before an answer is returned, the serene song of the Masonic lorelei lures the newly made Mason to the dangerous shores of overcommitment. *Hey...join the York Rite, the degrees are incredible, join the Scottish Rite, the degrees are amazing, join the Shrine and help support the hospitals, come see the mysteries of the Grotto* and the song plays on. All of a sudden, we find ourselves involved in so many Masonic activities, we become overwhelmed and fragmented in our focus.

Brethren; there is much to learn in the Blue Lodge.

Masonry is a system of morality veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols. Think about that statement: *Masonry is a system.* Systems are always deliberate in design and while they can contain contradictions and errors, it is the principle design and implementation of the system that matters.

Some believe that when they petitioned to become a Mason, it was for the Mysteries of Masonry and that they received them upon completion of the Master Mason degree—this is not true. We petitioned for the degrees of Masonry which can lead us to the mysteries—but these will only reveal themselves after tremendous study and research.

Veiled in allegory; Illustrated by symbols—Masonic symbolism is the language of Freemasonry.

WARDENS RETREAT 08

Open to all Master Masons. Officer of Lodges and Appendant Bodies are especially encouraged to attend the 2008 Warden's Retreat Program. Ladies are encouraged to attend and participate in program designed especially for them.

LODGE LEADERSHIP

The Warden's Retreat Program of the Grand Lodge of Texas is the education program that prepares Senior and Junior Wardens to accept the leadership role as Master of their lodges. In addition, there is an educational program for the ladies to prepare them to assist their Masons in being successful as Master. There are separate programs for the Junior Wardens and Senior Wardens. The Retreat Program is presented by the Committee on Masonic Education and Service and the elected Grand Lodge Officers and their Ladies.

Open to all interested Master Masons, participants engage in classroom type instruction, team building and group activities, and open question and answer periods. The program is structured, fast paced, intense and provides opportunities to exercise leadership and management skills. There are opportunities to visit one-on-one with the instructors and Grand Lodge Officers.

Registration begins Friday afternoon at 5:00 p.m. with the program kicking off at 7:00 p.m. and ending at Noon Sunday. Participants receive all retreat supplies and materials, three meals on Saturday, breakfast on Sunday.

Designed for Texas Masons, the program is open to all Master Masons and their Ladies. Officers of the Lodges and appendant Masonic bodies are especially encouraged to attend. Make your plans now to join us for the 2008 Retreat Program and prepare to lead your Masonic organization into the future.

The registration fee is \$200.00 for a Warden and \$125.00 for Ladies, if received four (4) weeks in advance.

The Wardens Retreat for the Austin area will take place at the Radisson North Hotel located at 6000 Middle Fiskville Road the weekend of September 12 - 14th.

All Masons interested in learning more about lodge administration are highly encouraged to attend.
